Context. Most of these objections seem to be addressed to the issue of defining what makes a cult by its theology or its belief system. In other words, most objections are directed toward the *theological definition* of a cult. Very few object to referring to groups such as the Heaven's Gate group or The Brethren (a.k.a. the Roberts Group or the "Garbage Eaters") as cults.

Historical Note. The term "cult" was originally used as a *religious* term, to describe the worship of a deity; therefore, it seems appropriate to continue using the theological definition.
